University of California Cooperative Extension - Urban Ag Program

The UC Cooperative Extension Bay Area Urban Ag and Food Systems Program's Mission is to conduct applied research and education supporting healthy and safe food and lands access and security for and with diverse residents of Alameda, Contra Costa, and San Francisco Counties. It serves as a resource in San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties and the North Bay as needed.

Program staff provide agricultural technical assistance and resources to urban farms, community and school gardens, faith based, institutional, residential and therapeutic food growing groups. Collaborations partner with local non-profit organizations, community based volunteer groups, policy makers and governmental agencies to leverage in-kind resources, grants and donations for this purpose.

The program monitors and evaluates impacts in terms of knowledge, behavior and changing conditions through a participatory approach. Such inclusion encompasses an equity lens focused on food security, resource conservation, environmental quality, youth, human, social and economic development, food as medicine, and food-growing, gleaning, and sharing activities as horticultural therapy.

About this Urban Farming Resource Guide

This guide gathers together urban farms – plus their supporting groups and agencies – that grow food for those beyond their own families'/growers' needs. Some grow food for sales or donations; others are for profit, non-profit or volunteer based groups, or a mix of these. Most groups listed do not fit neatly into any one category but actually serve their communities in a variety of ways.

Organizations listed have missions to support local food grown without chemical inputs, and value open space access, security, environmental and human health, community development and/or preservation of ancestral/culturally-relevant food growing practices.

Though significantly representative of the Bay Area's Neighbor-Food Web, this FREE Guide is not meant to be an exhaustive list. Groups listed may request to be removed or their entries updated or edited at any time by emailing rbennaton@ucanr.edu, and edits will be completed as able. This guide supports Urban Farming groups who generate revenue through tours of their sites, who uplift their organizational sustainability, capacity, and who ensure permanent open space preservation, as able.

Most urban farming groups' focus is on the concurrent benefits of growing food in community, and the resulting Social, Health, and Economic Impacts of Urban Agriculture rather than on production agriculture ([Research - Urban Agriculture \(ucanr.edu\)](#)). **(Live link)**. This Guide highlights and links the Bay Area's Neighbor-Food Network while UCCE's Urban Ag & Food Systems Program seeks to bridge resource gaps, and raise the viability of the urban farming network, so, Let's Grow Together Bay Area!
